TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 7th.—The peace settlement of the Versailles Treaty with Germany is likely to become effective on the 28th., the signing of the protocol and the exchange of ratifications between Germany and such of the Allied Powers who have already ratified the Treaty, taking place on that date.

Berlin, Nov. 7th.—A general strike called among the metal workers did not materialize. The strike collapsed, following the occupation of the headquarters of the Independent Socialists by troops.

London, Nov. 7th. According to advices received here, General Denekine reports that his Cossacks have destroyed a Soviet Division east of Khop, capturing 3,300 prisoners.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—Sea Island Cotton has been attacked by the boll weevil and a serious loss in the crop is anticipated in consequence.

St. Thomas, Nov. 11th. Cable between Halifax and Bermuda restored.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—A forty-eight hour week was adopted by a vote of 55 to 2 by the International Labour Con-

ference after a five hour debate yesterday. The opponents to the measure were Mr. Draper of Canada and Mr. Gompers of the United States. The working week however is to be governed by the exigencies of the different plants and industries, and mutual agreements for longer working hours may be made necessary.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—President Wilson has proclaimed 27th November as Thanksgiving Day this year.

London, Nov. 7th.—Speaking in the House of Commons yesterday the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs stated that the present measure of economic pressure on Russia will be continued until a Democratic Government is established in that country which can be recognized by the allies.

Helsingfors, Nov. 7th.—The Estonian Bureau in the city learns that General Yudenitch has succeeded in extricating the greater number of his troops, after heavy losses had been suffered, but that his forces in the regions of Luca and Gathina have been completely cut off by Bolshevik cavalry.

London, Nov. 8th.—Following is the result of the race for the Liverpool Autumn Cup: 1st, My Dear; 2nd, Al steam; 3rd, Sir Berkeley.

Madrid, Nov 9th.—The King and Queen of Belgium arrived in Lisbon last night on board the "George Washington". They landed and drove about the city, where they were given a hearty welcome.

Belgrade, Nov. 8th.—The forces of the Italian Government are reported to have clashed with Gabriel Dannunzio's troops, casualties being suffered by both sides. The report adds that there is much disaffection among Dannunzio's forces and very little discipline exists.

Vladivostok, Nov. 8th.—The British Far East detachment departed homeward today on board the transport "Mont Eagle". There now remain only General Knox, Chief of the British Military Mission, and about 50 officers in Siberia.

Helsingfors Nov. 8th.—The forces of General Yudenitch have retreated to Weissenstein, according to a communication received here from North Western Russia. The Bolshevik report states that the retreat continues, General Yudenitch's forces being hard pressed all along the lines.

Boston, Nov. 8th.—The U. S. Shipping Board vessel "Portland" is sinking at sea, according to a wireless message received at the naval wireless station here. The message, which was intercepted by the station at Otter Cliffs, gave her position as being about 50 miles due east of Halifax. The steamer "Kitmardia" also picked up the wireless appeal for assistance and is proceeding to the scene some 300 miles away. A later report says that the "Portland" has been abandoned in a sinking condition.

Indianapolis, Nov. 8th.—Acting President Lewis of the Miners Federation to-

day denied that he had made any statement as to whether he had agreed to comply with the court order to call off the strike of coal miners before Tuesday the 11th. A decision in this respect will be reached at a meeting set for Monday.

Geneva, Nov. 8th.—Japanese here, with the full consent and authority of the Japanese Minister for War, are attempting to recruit Swiss officers and sub-officers for the Japanese army, says a newspaper which adds that this alleged recruiting is in direct violation of the Swiss Constitution.
