To Whom It May Concern.

Editor St. Croix Avis:—

Some days ago you called attention to the profiteering in the fish market, and directed the notice of the Food Commission to the exorbitant prices prevailing here in Christiansted which used to be noted for its reasonable prices of fish. So far as known no regard has been paid to your comment, and no steps taken toward rectifying what is fast

becoming an intolerable situation, and the public is still looking at the so-called Food Commission and wondering of what possible use it is. Your attention is now drawn to something else that has caused people to sit up and ask "what next"? It is the export of sugar from St. Croix to St. Thomas to which you made reference yesterday under official news. It is positively stated that that sugar has been sold to St. Thomas at 11 cents a pound, while here in the island the wholesale price is 13 cents. Now will you for the last time call upon the Food Commission to come forward and in public print explain to the people what it is doing in these matters? The public has a right to know how its interests are being protected or endangered by its deputies, and if the price of raw fish is to be any figure the ignorant unreasonable fisherman chooses to fix upon it, and sugar can be exported to St. Thomas at a lower price than the people pay in the island where it is manufactured, an appeal of some sort will have to be got up to abolish the organization known as the Food Commission of St. Croix.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, March 14th.—The Chamber of Commerce has adopted a resolution demanding that the Government should pass a law prohibiting strikers in the public services.

Stockholm, March 14th — General Yudenitch will leave here for Paris in a few days time.

Paris, March 14th.—The Conference of Ambassadors has decided to send the German Govt. a firm note demanding the immediate punishment of the authors of the outrages of which the officers of the Allied missions have been the victims. At the request of England the council decided to send a demand to Jugo Slavia to evacuate certain territory which has been occupied contrary to the decision of the Conference.

Constantinople, March 14th.—A new Cabinet has been formed by Salis Pachá, who becomes President of the Council and Minister of Marine.

Paris, March 14th.—It is understood that the Govt. will shortly present a project re-establishing diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

Berlin, March 14th.—The troops returning from the Baltic Provinces, who were lodged in the barracks at Doberitz, have entered Berlin and occupied the Wilhelmstrasse. A proclamation announces that the Govt. of the Empire has ceased to exist and that the power passes into the hands of General Von Knapp who becomes Chancellor and appoints General Von Luttwitz Commander of the Military forces. The Constituent Assembly is dissolved. The Socialist Party has declared a general strike.
