Constantinople, Aug. 6th.—Relations between Afghanistan and Great Britain depend upon the attitude of Britain towards Turkey, it was declared by the Afghan Ambassador to the Turkish Nationalist Government, in the course of an address delivered at a luncheon at Angora yesterday. He declared that his country would stand by Turkey as a loyal ally, and would declare war on Great Britain if that country took the part of the Greeks. He asserted that if Britain give secret support to Greece Afghanistan would stir up intrigues between the tribes on the north-western frontier of India.

London, Aug. 6th.—The Imperial conference agreed that the war reparations receipts should be apportioned as follows: Great Britain 86.85%, minor colonies 50%, Canada 4.35%, Australia 4.35%, New Zealand 170%, South Africa 60% New Foundland 40%, India 1.20%. Total 100%.

Berlin, Aug. 6th.—The "Abend Post" of Leipzig today says that Lieutenant Commander Patzig, who commanded the German submarine which sank the British hospital ship Llandovery Castle during the war, who is now in South America, has declared his intention of returning to Germany and surrendering himself for trial by the Leipzig court. The newspaper says that Patzig will surrender himself because he claims that he, and not Lieuts. Ludwig Dittmar, and Johann Boldt, was alone responsible for the act. Both Dittmar and Boldt were sentenced to 4 years imprisonment for the act by the Leipzig court.

Copenhagen, Aug. 6th.—The Russian Bolshevik premier Lenine plans, subject to British permission, to leave soon for Scotland for a holiday, says a special despatch from Reval.
